

Alice Lloyd College Receives National Attention on NPR

Alice Lloyd College was recently featured by National Public Radio (NPR) in the article “Here’s How 2 Schools Have Made Free College Work – For Decades.” The article discusses ALC’s unique business model and offers other colleges tips to help offset the cost of tuition. One of the tips focuses on ALC’s unique stance on debt. The College does not undertake a project on campus unless they have the resources fully committed before starting it.

The article also mentions ALC’s Student Work Program. Students at ALC work up to twenty hours per week in various positions across campus to help offset the cost of their education. That, paired with the Appalachian Leaders College Scholarship, a scholarship that guarantees the full cost of tuition to students from ALC’s 108-county service area, helps students graduate from ALC with little to no debt.

When the founder of Alice Lloyd College arrived on Caney Creek in the early 1900s, she found a group of people with little money but a strong work ethic. The area was desperate for learning, and she committed her life to educating anyone willing to work for their tuition. Her goal has spanned several generations, touched multiple lives, and garnered the attention of numerous national platforms.



Honorable Edward B. Atkins Visits ALC Criminal Justice Class


On November 21, 2019, the **Honorable Edward B. Atkins** visited the Judicial Process class at Alice Lloyd College to discuss his role in the federal judicial system. He serves as a United States Magistrate Judge for the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Kentucky. **Judge Atkins** received his bachelor’s degree in biology from Centre College in 1984, and his law degree from the University of Kentucky in 1990. **Judge Atkins** then served as a law clerk for the **Honorable Joseph M. Hood** on the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Kentucky from 1990 to 1992. Following his clerkship, he entered private practice until 2006 in Pikeville, Kentucky. On August 24, 2006, **Judge Atkins** was sworn in as a United States Magistrate Judge and serves the Courts in Pikeville, Ashland, Lexington and Frankfort, Kentucky.

Cathy Jones, adjunct professor of criminal justice, stated, “Judge Atkins’ willingness to share his judicial experience and support of the criminal justice program demonstrates a key component of ethical Alice Lloyd College’s mission: possess high moral and ethic values and a sense of service to others. We continue to identify leaders in the criminal

justice field throughout the Appalachian region who can speak to living a life of justice, integrity, and service and at the same time, increase awareness of our newly established criminal justice major. I am also proud of our students based upon their classroom communications with **Judge Atkins**.”



Dalton McCown: Investing in the Future



Dalton McCown is from neighboring Letcher County, Kentucky. His “academic pursuits first” policy has allowed him to garner an impressive collection of accolades including being selected as a Kentucky Governor’s Scholar and attending both the University of Pikeville and University of Kentucky medical professional education programs. However, **Dalton** strove for more. He wanted to be educated at an institution that wanted to know *him* and, after attending The June Buchanan School, he knew just the place. He states, “I knew Alice Lloyd College was for me when I took my first walk along the Purpose Road. I had toured other colleges and being a Governor’s Scholar would’ve given me full-tuition at almost every public university in Kentucky, but of all the places I went, this one was different.”

When asked what made ALC different, **Dalton** responded, “The people here are cut from a different fabric, they breathe a different air, they want to know you and most importantly, they want to help you.” **Dalton** cited his personal relationships with mentors, professors, and like-minded students as reasons for not applying to any other college or university. Further saying, “I knew what I wanted for undergraduate education, and the Purpose Road Philosophy not only exemplifies that but encourages it.”

Dalton wants to be a rural physician and come back to the mountains to help the people who helped him. He believes it’s only right to support those who have assisted him this far. He quotes his late grandfather’s saying, “You dance with who brought you.” His ultimate goal is to research substance abuse treatment methods and aid in the fight against the opioid epidemic that Eastern Kentucky currently faces. He says, “I know they say it takes a village to raise a child, but I have so much more than that here in Pippa Passes; I have a home.”

His family has also been a major influence in his life. His father, a carpenter, has taught him the value of labor, and in order to achieve what he wants in this world, he will have to work hard for it. His mother is the director of nursing at a local hospital and has encouraged him to pursue his passion of saving lives by obtaining a medical degree. **Dalton’s** sister, **Kaci**, has continually motivated him to be the good in the world by not only setting the good example but living to *be* that example. He speaks fondly of his family, saying,

“My family is everything to me. I have parents, grandparents, and neighbors who’ve given me the world. I would not be the person I am today if it were not for them and those like them.”

The motivation from his family has led **Dalton** to pursue his goal by double majoring in Biology (Pre-Medicine) and English. While strongly focused on his studies, **Dalton** also manages to stay

involved in campus affairs such as being Vice President of the Allied Health Club, participating in the ALC Theatre Club, and working as a teaching assistant in the Natural Sciences and Mathematics department. He also enjoys intramural basketball and utilizing Alice Lloyd College’s newly built Campus Center weight room. Recently, **Dalton** was also inducted into the Duncan Leadership Institute and was a first recipient of the Alice Lloyd Centennial Alumni Scholarship.

In the classroom, **Dalton** continues to strive academically. He has made the President’s list every semester, and competed and won several competitions on campus. He won the first annual Great Caney Hackathon, placed in the top every year he has competed in the annual Mongiardo Speech Competition, and recently won the DeFillips essay competition. His love for English has inspired him to begin authoring a novel, and he frequently enters writing competitions on campus.

Dalton summed up his beliefs by saying, “I’ve managed to find a place where people want me to succeed, a college that wants to help me do it with little to no cost to me, and a family to inspire me. I can’t fully express my gratitude to donors, faculty, and staff, who make this experience possible. They invested in me, and when I come back to the mountains after medical school, their investment will pay off. That is my goal, my purpose.” Assisting students in achieving their goals and thus fulfilling their purpose continues to resonate among the Appalachian Mountains as the mission of Alice Lloyd College.

ATHLETIC HALL OF FAME WELCOMES THREE NEW MEMBERS



Kaylan Richardson Centers attended Alice Lloyd College from 2005-2009 where she graduated with a Business Administration Degree. As a sophomore, she finished third on the team in scoring, with 11.9 points per game and finished second in the conference in both three-point field goals made per game, and total three pointers made. She led the squad in scoring at 13.1 points per game her junior season, placing her seventh in the conference. Her senior year, she finished sixth in the conference in scoring while finishing second in the conference and seventh in the nation in three-point field goals made. Her 2007 squad finished as the KIAC regular season champions, while her 2009 club reached the conference finals once more. She was twice voted to the All-Conference Squad. **Kaylan** currently resides in Owenton, Kentucky, where she is employed as an Inside Sales Representative at North American Stainless. With her Hall of Fame induction, she becomes the third generation from her family to enter this exclusive club, joining both her grandfather, **Elmer Slone**, and uncle, **Daryl Slone**.

David Hatfield attended Alice Lloyd College from 2002-2007 where he majored in Sports and Fitness Management and was a four-year member of the Eagles baseball team. He was a rare, three position player who pitched as well as played second and third base. His greatest asset was his pitching where he performed as a key member of the relief squad. He was the recipient of the Rookie of the Year Award after his first season and would be named to the Academic All-Conference Team in the Appalachian Athletic Conference as a sophomore. His junior and senior seasons would see him chosen as an Academic All-Conference selection in the Kentucky Intercollegiate Athletic Conference. Due to his knowledge and dedication of the game, he was appointed to the Eagles Baseball coaching staff. Currently, he resides in Pippa Passes, Kentucky, and has been employed by Alice Lloyd College for the past 14 years as a member of the Student Services Department and Athletic Department.



Jeremy Osborne attended Alice Lloyd College from 1997-2001 where he graduated with a Biology Degree. As a member of the Eagles basketball team, he was known for his fine all-around game. During his four-year college career, he was a dependable scorer, tenacious defender, and hard-nosed rebounder. He was voted to the Freshman All-Conference Team, and each season thereafter, his numbers improved as he took on a bigger role on both ends of the court.. By his senior year, he was presented the Best Defensive Player Award and was regarded as one of the top defenders in the conference. At the end of his senior season, he accumulated 1,042 points and grabbed 782 rebounds. He is one of a small group of individuals to score over 1000 points and amass over 750 rebounds during their career. Currently, he resides in Emmalena, Kentucky, and is the co-operator of his family business: R & J Well Service and Horizon Natural Gas.


Margaret "Margo" Reedy Sparkman was born in Martin, Kentucky, and graduated from Knott County High School in 1972. She attended Alice Lloyd College after graduation, but in 1973 she married **Kenneth Sparkman** after he returned home from his station in Korea. For the next four years, **Margo** was a homemaker and mother to her first child, **Phillip "Stacy."** She picked up her classes again

in 1977 as well as accepting the position of Accounts Payable Clerk at ALC. Her coursework was put on hold after the birth of her daughter, **Kendra.** In time, **Margo** resumed her studies earning her BA in Business Administration at ALC in 2004, and her MBA from the University of the Cumberlands in 2013.

For 42 years, **Margo** has served Alice Lloyd College through several managerial positions such as Director of Gift Receipting, Director of Planned Giving, and Direct Mail Specialist. She served the past seven years as Director of Development, but recently stepped down and is transitioning into semi-retirement. She earned ALC's Leadership in Service Award/Campus Employee of the Year Award in 2011 and 2019.

In addition to her service to the College, **Margo** also faithfully serves her community through the Caney Baptist Church. In 2005, **Margo** was diagnosed with one of the most difficult cancers to detect and cure – ovarian cancer. She feels extremely blessed to be a 14-year cancer survivor. She has always been a strong supporter of Alice Lloyd College because she realized the importance the College's mission has made in the Eastern Kentucky region. **Margo** and **Kenneth** recently celebrated 46 years of marriage and are blessed to have five grandchildren: **Chase, Justin, Gabriel, Gray, and Zella.**

George Nichols III was born in Bowling Green, Kentucky. In his early years, he was influenced by the strong women in his life who taught him how to be a better man. In his childhood, **George** developed a love for basketball and dreamed of turning it into a career. Basketball led him to ALC, but an English teacher transformed his outlook on higher education. He graduated from ALC in 1980, and went on to attend Western Kentucky University where he completed his BA in Sociology and Economics. He began a career in financial services after receiving his MA from the University of Louisville.



George continued to develop a skill for efficient problem-solving at the age of twenty-eight while holding the position as Chief Executive Officer of Central State Hospital in Louisville, Kentucky. After successfully tackling

the issues at Central State, **George** was brought on by Blue Cross and Blue Shield as Executive Director of Product Development. In 1995, he served as Executive Director for Kentucky's Health Policy Board. He continued to rise in his field and was appointed as Special Advisor to Governor Paul Patton in matters of health care policy and economic development for the financial services industry.

He has also served in numerous other positions such as President of the National Association of Insurance Commissioner, Chairman of the International Relations Committee, and Senior Vice President and Assistant to the Chairman of New York Life. Currently, **George** serves as the tenth President and CEO of The American College of Financial Services. His servant leadership has earned him many recognitions, such as being named to Savoy's list of Most Influential Blacks in Corporate America in 2012 and 2018. He is also the first African-American Insurance Commissioner, the first African-American president of the NAIC, and the first African-American elected to New York Life's Executive Management Committee. **George Nichols** has served on ALC's Board of Trustees for eighteen years. He is a devoted family man, and currently resides in Haverford, Pennsylvania, with his wife **Cynthia Jean (CJ)** and his three adult children: **Courtney, Jessica, and George IV.**

Their daughter, **Wendi Bernau**, is officially in charge of running the organization, which supports groups that promote the Biblical world view in education, apprenticeship, and politics in a fiscally responsible way.

For the past 15 years, the Foundation has proudly supported our mission by helping us guarantee tuition to students in the Appalachian region, supporting K-12 students at The June Buchanan School, as well as donating to the Caney Scholars Program, which helps graduates from Alice Lloyd College attend graduate or professional school. Did you know we are the only college to financially support our graduates as they go on to further their education?

In addition to the strong work ethic that ALC instills in its students, **Ted and Ruth** wholly support the Judeo-Christian principles upon which the College was founded.

"We were impressed with how Alice Lloyd College endorses Christian values, and how the institution is not afraid to stand up for those values, especially in today's world. We try to live by God's word every day and are glad to see a place where that is encouraged."

Originally from New Jersey, **Ruth** and **Ted** now reside in Virginia. They have four children and a host of grandchildren scattered throughout the country. Planned Giving News

Attention IRA Owners – Donate Your Required Minimum Distribution to Alice Lloyd College before December 31, 2019, and Avoid the Income Taxes

If you are 70½ or older, you are no doubt aware that you are required to take a minimum distribution from your IRA each year. And, this distribution is TAXABLE INCOME! If you are in a position where you don't need the additional income – and certainly don't need additional income taxes – consider gifting a portion of your RMD directly to Alice Lloyd College. Your gift will help Appalachian students striving for a higher education, and you will avoid the income taxes.

Know the IRS rules

In order for your RDM to qualify as a Charitable IRA (CIRA) provision, you must follow the IRS rules.

According to the IRS, you:

- Must be 70½ or older at the time of the gift.
- Must have a traditional or other eligible IRA account.
- Must have the funds transferred directly from the IRA to a qualified charitable entity like Alice Lloyd College.
- Must not receive any benefits of value in return for the gift (no tax deduction because you weren't taxed).
- Must not exceed a total of \$100,000 in qualified charitable distributions to all charities combined in a single tax year.
- Must properly report an IRA distribution to charity on your tax return.
